

Funding Women, Changing Lives - It's what we do!

Funding women has been at the core of our work since Mary's Pence was founded over 30 years ago. Providing capacity building and support through coaching, conversing and connecting has always been part of our work, too. It's what makes the funding effective.

Mary's Pence was awarded the Responsive Philanthropy Award by the Minnesota Council of Nonprofits in October 2017. It was an incredible honor to be nominated by one of our local grantees, *Reviving the Islamic Sisterhood for Empowerment (RISE)*. As much as the award itself means, it was the fact that one of our grantees recognized and appreciated the support we provide, beyond the money. This past year, we have intensified our efforts to provide responsive funding and support.

Supporting Mary's Pence Grantees

In our Mary's Pence Grants program, we strive to make our application process easy for small organizations and we seek ways to support and enrich their efforts. We provide networking opportunities for grantees working on similar concerns or facing common questions. We also connect grantees with additional resources, including other funders and learning opportunities, and amplify their voices.

This year for the first time we brought representatives from our current grantees together for a retreat. Staff, board and volunteers from organizations had a chance to learn, relax and connect. Their response was inspiring! The grantees requested a Facebook group to stay in touch, and want to get together via regular teleconferences so they can discuss common issues and share information. Seeing grantees gathered in one room reminded me that we are not alone in facing the stress involved in running a small nonprofit, and that through connections and relationships, our impact is multiplied.

We are very pleased this year to have been able to add a new position of grants manager to make this deeper capacity building possible.

Accompanying ESPERA Women

This year, we are delighted to celebrate 10 years of the ESPERA community lending program. Throughout the year the ESPERA staff walk side by side with the leaders and women of our eight ESPERA partners in Mexico and Central America. They act as a supportive coach as the groups plan their work, grow and expand their programs, or deal with broader community issues and threats. We call this accompaniment.

Accompaniment begins with intense listening. By listening we learned about the stress, violence and oppression the women experience, and we responded by initiating an emotional wellness program. Listening to the women also points us toward ways to strengthen groups by funding overhead costs, strategic planning, and various trainings.

At its foundation, ESPERA is about creating locally owned lending pools. We found that circulating money is the easy part. Building relationships and supporting skills development takes more effort but is essential.

I am grateful to all of our donors who understand that funding and building capacity are intertwined!

Funding Women

Cumulatively over the last 10 years, 1,149 women have received 2,062 loans totaling \$708,993. All this from a baseline investment of \$143,150 from Mary's Pence. \$71,917 has been collected in interest and \$14,758 has been contributed to savings. Mary's Pence has provided \$87,809 directly to our partners for capacity building activities. 352 women received loans in fiscal year 2018.

Increasing Capacity

In addition to our ongoing capacity building and business skill development, Mary's Pence launched an initiative to increase mental and emotional health support for ESPERA women in November 2017. That month, a pilot workshop was held with over 50 women. A psychologist facilitated activities that enabled the women to explore their trauma in a safe place, and taught the women exercises that they can incorporate into their daily routines to help reduce stress. Since then, a small group of leaders in El Salvador has been participating in monthly workshops with the goal of not only improving their own mental health, but ultimately being able to support other women in their communities. The second emotional wellness workshop was held in September 2018, and a third is currently being planned for the fall of 2019.

Looking ahead

Encuentro

In January 2019, Mary's Pence will hold the 2nd Encuentro of ESPERA women – a four-day working retreat with 70 representatives from each of our ESPERA partners. Most of the ESPERA women have never traveled outside of their communities. This is a unique opportunity for them to learn, to share their experiences with Mary's Pence staff and one another, and to actively participate in shaping the future of the ESPERA program.

Evaluation

At the Encuentro, we will launch an evaluation of the ESPERA program. Two evaluators from Spain who have lived in El Salvador for more than a decade will be guiding program participants and leaders in this process. Through a variety of exercises, we will attain a deeper grasp on what has been effective in the ESPERA model and we will uncover and explore further opportunities for expanded support.

Emotional Wellness

Over the past year, staff and community leaders have crafted a variety of workshops about women's mental health and emotional healing. Mary's Pence will continue this empathetic and holistic approach to accompaniment by continuing to do small workshops on a regular basis and large group workshops once a year.

Funding Women

In fiscal year 2018, Mary's Pence provided \$74,794 in direct support to 18 grantees. This year, we granted primarily to organizations working on empowerment and leadership development. Especially, we granted to several organizations working with young women and girls, including Code/Art, La Casita Center, Galanjo, Project DIVA, and WomenNC.

Increasing Capacity

"It's rare for funders to support grantees beyond monetary support. This opens the door for engaging in an ongoing dialogue with our grantees, creating opportunities for them to navigate setbacks and receive support as they work towards their missions," says Mary's Pence Grants Manager, Robyn Browning. This is precisely what she's been doing for Mary's Pence Grantees since she was hired in January 2018.

In September, Mary's Pence held our inaugural grantee retreat, which brought together 23 representatives from 14 grantee organizations to reflect and

relax, share insight, and learn together about "Messaging Your Social Justice Mission."

One grantee shared:

I cannot express how wonderful it was to not only have an opportunity to learn and network, but to feel valued by a funder to give us professional development opportunities and make us feel worthy of taking this time away from our work. It is often overwhelming and exhausting, but it is inspiring to meet others in the same boat and not feel like we are alone. Your generosity both financially and emotionally has blown me away.

Looking ahead

We are pleased to have raised our granting amounts to \$5,000 and our total granting pool to \$100,000 for fiscal year 2019.

Mary's Pence is committed to offering ongoing support to our grantee partners. Plans for regularly scheduled gatherings – both virtual and in person – are being developed and implemented collaboratively with our grantees.

The board and staff at Mary's Pence joyfully approach our work with deep gratitude for the supporters who make this work possible, for those who came before us, and for all those who are working for justice today.

Solidarity With Women on the Margins

We believe that women and others who are marginalized have the wisdom to create effective change within their communities, should be represented in decision-making roles, and funded by the philanthropic community.

Therefore:

- We provide responsive and flexible funding and capacity building for women-led organizations that would typically be overlooked by larger mainstream funders. We do not shy away from the complexity of meeting women where they are.
- We advocate for women's full equality and participation in all aspects of society by partnering to lift women's voices and expand their opportunities.
- We provide a platform for individuals to support grassroots organizations created by and for women and other marginalized people.

Commitment to Long-term Social Change

We believe that current structures and norms in society create injustice. In order to achieve justice, we must work toward promoting the common good and affecting systemic change.

Therefore:

- We support a broad array of projects that are working to change systems.
- We support efforts to create lasting change that will impact the community far beyond any individual or organization's lifespan.
- We provide a platform for individuals to support those who are working to change systems





Inclusivity and Collaboration

We believe that the best organizational models are those that share influence, leadership and power. Everyone has a piece of the truth.

Therefore:

- We seek to support organizations with structures that share influence, leadership and power and that involve community members in decision-making and the creation of programs.
- We seek diverse voices and experiences on our board and staff. We make decisions by consensus and rotate leadership roles at the board and committee level.
- We value contributions of all sizes.

Transparency and Trust

We believe that open communication and trusting relationships are necessary for truly collaborative decision-making processes. And we believe that donors should know how their money is used.

Therefore:

- We have implemented processes for open and honest communications among staff, board, grantees, ESPERA partners, donors, funders, and community partners.
- We evaluate our work in a way that is meaningful for grantees and ESPERA partners, donors, funders, and for us.
- We work with a committee of board, staff, and volunteers to review financial statements monthly, and make financial documents and certifications available on our website.



Her hard work and participation in *ASMUR* and ESPERA make it possible for Berta to provide a home, basic needs, and a future for her daughter, despite health issues caused by the toxic chemicals used during the war.

Project DIVA

Minneapolis, Minnesota

Project DIVA is a mentoring and coaching program that provides black girls the space to simply be who they are, and to dream without limits, while also teaching applicable skills to support them in achieving their goals.

DIVA is an acronym for Dignity, Integrity, Virtue, and Availability, the values of the DIVA sisterhood. The girls are taught a financial literacy curriculum and are also supported by mentors who coach them in the areas of academics, social health, emotional well-being, health and wellness, and career exploration. The young women who participate in *Project DIVA* know that within them is the power to change their future, and the future of their community.

ACOPEDIS is a non-profit organization that advocates for full inclusion of people with disabilities located in the Sololá region of Guatemala. As a rehabilitation based community, ACOPEDIS attends to the health, nutritional, educational and social needs of its members.

In Guatemala, women have lower employment rates than men. The employment gap is even greater for people with disabilities. Through the ESPERA lending pool, individuals living with disabilities as well as mothers of children with disabilities invest in income generating initiatives. Project: Women's Friendship Group

People often fear what they do not understand. This is evident in the angry Islamophobic and xenophobic comments that permeate current public discourse. The *Iraqi and American Reconciliation Project* creates bridges of understanding through the arts, education, cultural and professional exchanges, and peace-building projects.

To counter stereotypes and build understanding and respect, *IARP* has established *Women's Friendship Groups*. Each group is comprised of 6 Iraqi and 6 non-Iraqi women, who get to know and care about one another, understand what they share as women, and learn about each other's culture. *Friendship Groups* meet monthly during the school year to share stories and insights as they build relationships in a safe space.

Women in El Salvador are routinely exploited as workers and make very low wages. Participants in the ESPERA lending program are able to increase their earnings to improve their quality of life. Aminta uses her ESPERA lending pool to buy fabric to sew sports uniforms for schools. As she has grown her business, she now also provides employment for her family and friends in the community.

Soul2Soul Sisters promotes racial justice by engaging white inter-faith communities to work for racial justice and Black inter-faith groups in healing and liberation. Soul2Soul aims to dismantle racism and create just communities. In 2015, Rev. Tawana Davis and Rev. Dr. Dawn Riley Duval hosted the first of their anti-racism workshops, which are now held across Colorado in white faith communities.

Activism is an incredibly stressful endeavor. *Audre's Song*, a program supported by Mary's Pence, offers peer support for Black women activists. By providing a place for open sharing and networking, *Audre's Song* combats a sense of isolation, reduces stress and anxiety and is a valuable resource for mutual support for those engaged in racial activism.

AMUCES works to increase economic empowerment for Salvadoran women who are blind and visually impaired. Their strategy includes the formation of a therapeutic massage business. Through their employment as massage therapists, blind women can work toward economic autonomy, a crucial element of self-advocacy.

As members of the *Red Unión de Mujeres Salvadoreñas*, the women of *AMUCES* have used funds from the ESPERA lending pool to invest in marketing for the business they created, Xpress Massage. The eight women pictured are the staff of Xpress Massage, who offer clients a variety of modern massage techniques.

Project: Mujeres Líderes

MNSM organizes immigrant and allied faith communities to create just and humane treatment of immigrants in the US. Because immigrant men are the most frequent targets of the Department of Homeland Security for incarceration or deportation, women and children are often left behind to cope without their husbands or fathers.

In addition to supporting undocumented immigrant women and their children with basic needs and legal assistance, MNSM offers a leadership curriculum called Mujeres Líderes. Through participation in Mujeres Líderes immigrant women build skills to become agents of systemic change and advocates for immigration justice. Throughout the program, women learn about the role of past Latina leaders, and practice community organizing in real situations.


Cincinnati, Ohio

Lydia's House addresses this need by offering emergency and transitional housing for single-mother-lead families living in poverty. The staff of Lydia's House believe that meeting immediate needs must be accompanied by advocacy to change the unjust policies that contribute to homelessness.

Uprooting Injustice Together is a Lydia's House initiative to equip staff, guests and former guests as advocates for change and just policies. Training materials assist the Lydia's House extended community in the planning of and participation in direct action. Lydia's House is an excellent model of a two pronged approach to social change: charity and social justice.
