Letter from the Executive Director

This is my last letter as Executive Director of Mary's Pence, I will be retiring by the end of January. I'm so proud to have been part of this work for 17 years. We are excited to welcome a new Executive Director in January, more to come.

In this annual report we have made an effort to make a connection between the work of our two programs, which on the surface look very different. As we reflected on this we spent time comparing how we support our grantees and ESPERA partners, and what needs their work is filling in women's lives. The comparison is quite striking. I hope you take the time to read about it in the following pages.

We know there continues to be a strong need for this work.

We have increasing demand in both the Grants program and ESPERA.

- We've seen a 500% increase in demand for grants in the US, with over 500 requests for 20 grants in the past year.
- There is ongoing interest from new groups in Central America and Mexico to join ESPERA. We grew from 12 partner organizations three years ago to a total of 19.

Our current culture and politics are challenging. Many of our US grantees are feeling vulnerable financially and targeted for their identity or their work. Some of our partners in Central America are facing oppressive governments, increased administrative burdens placed on them by authorities, and repression of work that relates to human rights and women's rights.

When I joined Mary's Pence ESPERA was just beginning and now it is thriving, supporting over 700 women in creating economic security, establishing women's leadership in the communities, planting family farms, and fostering health and emotional wellness. Staff accompany women through visits and *encuentros*, or gatherings.

The Grants program has gone beyond the dollars to provide virtual networking opportunities for grantees, and hosting an annual grantee gathering. In both programs, we have always chosen to go into deeper relationship with those we support.

These times call for persistence and love.

Our work is based on the values of dignity, justice and solidarity. The longer I've done this work, the more strongly I know that love and respect for all, no matter their background, color, faith or views, is key. And the more strongly I feel that community building is essential. When people feel part of a community, both a strong cultural community, and a part of a bigger, inclusive and democratic community, the less they are drawn to individualism

I'm grateful for all the women who have been part of Mary's Pence, especially Sister Maureen Gallagher OP, who was among our founders and was the first staff person in 1987. I'm indebted to the many staff, board, volunteers, and donors for their work and financial support. And I am grateful for our grantee organizations and ESPERA partners who sow the seeds of love into this work.

As I step away, I have confidence that the work we have nurtured together will continue to grow and bear fruit, guided by love, hope, and the commitment of all who carry it forward.



At Mary's Pence, the work we do through both our U.S. Grants program and the ESPERA program in Central America and Mexico is guided by the same goal: improving women's lives. The needs of women are common across boundaries - economic security, fully participating in society, health and wellness, and safety from gender based violence. However, how we support the work on these issues may look different by region, because contexts differ. But the building blocks of support are the same.

How We Support Women Through ESPERA and Mary's Pence Grants

We Provide Financial Support

In Central America and Mexico, our grants create lending pools and fund capacity-building initiatives, while in the U.S., grants address underlying issues of injustive and create long term change.

We Fund Grassroots, Women-Led Organizations

In both programs we support community-based, women-led organizations committed to social justice and improving the lives of women.

We Build Capacity

Across both programs, we invest in training, infrastructure, and resources for women's

organizations, including office space and equipment, as well as skills-building workshops and coaching.

We Are Responsive to Needs

We trust local organizations and leaders to decide what their communities need most. We provide support and resources for their priorities.

We Build Community

Connection and collaboration make the work stronger. We bring women and organizations together through gatherings and networking opportunities that foster peer support, shared learning, and stronger collaboration.

The Issues and Needs We Address are Common Across Borders

To live a full and joyful life, we all need the same things - economic security, full participation, health and emotional wellness, and freedom from violence. The differing circumstances in the United States vs. Central America and Mexico require different means to achieve these goals. Here are some examples.

Economic Security	Women receive funding and training to invest in small businesses. Community-managed lending pools provide opportunities for women to create businesses where formal jobs are scarce. Rights to Full Participation	We partner with 19 women's groups representing local communities, offering peer support and collective advocacy. Health and Emotional Wellness	The Medical Assistance Fund supports women with illnesses or accidents that cause high costs or temporarily affect income. Emotional wellness workshops help women overcome challenges, build confidence, and pursue their goals.	Georgia Black Doula Network and Training Institute is dedicated to eradicating maternal and infant mortality experienced by Black families and improving maternal health outcomes in the state of Georgia.

Protection from Gender-Based Violence Income-generating opportunities, psychological intervention, and emotional wellness support have allowed some ESPERA women to leave abusive relationships.

Kind Hearted Women's Society advocates for visibility and justice around missing and murdered indigenous women and girls.

Mary's Pence remains responsive - funding and supporting work that is improving the lives of women. We are grateful for the women doing the hard work in their communities, and for the many supporters who trust us to use their dollars to make the world a better place.

Mary's Pence Grants: The Power of Showing Up Together

Mary's Pence shows up with intention, responding to real and dynamic needs of women (cis women, trans women and nonbinary people) by investing in grassroots organizations that help communities flourish in solidarity and justice. Our network of leaders, donors, partners, and volunteers is rooted in mutual trust. Donors know their support reaches groups with deep community ties, and grantees know we listen and walk alongside them. This mutual trust allows us to achieve more than any of us could accomplish alone. It creates a community where support is generous, connection is meaningful, and social justice is achieved through partnership and solidarity. Together, we are creating the world we wish to live in.

Providing Financial Support

\$157,500 in grants and \$15,750 in capacity-building grants

Funding Grassroots Organizations

Funded 23 small organizations with budgets under \$25,000. We are often their first grant.

Building Capacity

Capacity Building Grants

Funded 21 capacity-building grant requests for essential non-program needs such as training, equipment, retreats, communications tools, and consulting support.

Trainings and Gatherings

Hosted a Grantee Gathering with 19 participants from 9 organizations, featuring guest sessions on fundraising, administration, grant writing, evaluation, work-life balance, and communications. Grantees shared their expertise in policy and advocacy, the UN Sustainable Development Goals, and community organizing.

Hosted 3 grant writing workshops.

Being Responsive to Needs

We fund the issues women identify, responding to their needs across justice-focused issues.

We keep our application simple and provide all information and application materials in Spanish.

We talk with our grantees regularly throughout the year to understand needs.

Creating Community

Grantees are welcome to our Third Thursday Mid-Day Meet-Ups to discuss issues and share experiences.

We facilitate peer networking opportunities, connecting grantees with similar missions.

The work of the organizations we fund is focused on building strong local communities.



ESPERA: Economic Systems Providing Equitable Resources for All

For 17 years, the ESPERA program has partnered with women's organizations across Central America and Mexico. Through accompaniment, funding, and skill-building, we work to improve women's lives. This support helps address local needs and the systemic barriers that affect rural and Indigenous women. Focused on economic security, women's leadership and strong organizations, family farming, and emotional wellness, ESPERA continues to grow.

We are excited to welcome two new partners in Honduras: Fundación Intibucana de Desarrollo (FUNIDE), which strengthens women's economic opportunities through savings groups and emotional well-being, and the Center for the Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation of Torture Victims (CPTRT), which fosters healing and economic self-determination through small food production initiatives. Both align closely with ESPERA's values and will benefit from ongoing support and accompaniment.

Women Standing Together and Organizing

In August 2024, members of the ESPERA partner organization *Santa Rita de Casia* gathered in Cantón Veracruz, in the Tonacatepeque district of San Salvador, to check in with one another.

The women have been part of the ESPERA program since 2016, originally through ACOMEST, another Mary's Pence partner in El Salvador. In 2020, they chose to establish their own identity as Santa Rita de Casia, allowing them to select their own leaders and guide their collective vision. Since then, they continued participating in ESPERA, forming and managing their own lending pool and strengthening their work by creating an annual plan and participating in emotional wellness workshops, with the support and accompaniment of Mary's Pence.


